#### **Therapeutics**

- 139 Radical prostatectomy does not improve survival compared to observation for localised prostate cancer in a prospective randomised trial
- Double-balloon catheter results in higher rate of vaginal delivery within 24 h when compared with dinoprostone vaginal insert
- Lactobacillus probiotics may prevent recurrent UTIs in postmenopausal women
- Statin-induced lowering of LDL cholesterol associated with a reduced risk for cardiovascular events, not likely outweighed by the risk of diabetes, for people at low short-term risk of cardiovascular disease
- 143 Postpartum bleeding is reduced with sublingual powdered misoprostol when compared with oxytocin injection, but a new formulation of misoprostol is unlikely to revolutionise postpartum haemorrhage care
- Early surgery in infective endocarditis with large vegetations significantly reduced mortality compared with conventional treatment
- Coronary CT angiography decreases the length of stay in emergency department versus standard therapy in patients presenting with acute chest pain, but results in increased downstream testing and radiation exposure
- Randomised trial of exercise dose in children reduces diabetes risk (as measured by insulin resistance) in both 20-min and 40-min doses
- HIV consensus quideline recommends antiretroviral treatment regardless of CD4 count, new regimens and possible regimen change for chronic low level

#### **Prognosis**

- **151** Adequate enteral feeding in the pediatric intensive care unit may be associated with fewer nosocomial infections and deaths
- Disabled children are more likely to be exposed to 152 violence than their non-disabled peers
